Browne said damages were being accessed and that he didn't as of now have an estimate of clean up costs. He estimated that the costs could run into the "10's of thousands of dollars." "All this is just mind-bogling" said Browne said. "We've got roofers making temporary patches to the roof and clean up crews literally digging snow out of classrooms. This is a 76 year old building, so I don't know what this means structurally. I wish I had answers."

Browne had one answer: School will resume on Monday March 7th 2012 irregardless of the work needed on the building Browne said. "Even if we have to have classes at my house, we'll have classes on that Monday," said Browne.

The Aspera Board Education (A.B.E..) will be meeting in emergency session tonight. They will discuss how much emergency funding can be made available immediately on an emergency basis to the school board president Ed Eucate said.

"We will be deciding how much funding we can provide now on an emergency basis at 7the present moment," Eucate said. "This is a monumental problem that has to be delt with immediately,"

Officials apparently are looking into claims of faulty and shoddy work that Summus Roofing and repair did earlier this year that most likely lead to the roof collapse. They apparently inadvertently broke the joists that weakened the roof and never reported the joist incident to school officials.

Mrs. Thistlebottom said teachers had been allowed back to their classrooms. "All of this semester's assignments are there [in the classroom] as well as grades [also in the classroom]," Thistlebottom said. "If I can't salvage things [in the classroom], students may have to redo a months worth of work. Im also worried about my autobraphed copy of "The Winter of Our Discontent".
